
DIRECTIONS

Public Transportation: Take the U35 CampusLinie towards *Hustadt* from the center of Bochum or Hauptbahnhof (central station) and get off at the station *Wasserstraße*. From there turn right and cross the street, then left cross the crossroads passing by the copy shop at the corner and continue for ca. 200 metres until you reach Universitätsstrasse 90a.

By Car: The quickest route is via the motor-way junction Bochum/Witten, where the autobahns A43 and A44 meet. Simply take the exit Bochum-Querenburg, follow the signs to *Bochum Zentrum* to the cross-roads of Universitätsstrasse and Wasserstrasse. Take a u-turn left and continue this road for approx. 200 metres, until you reach Universitätsstrasse 90a. Parking is possible in front and behind the building.

The Material Dimension of Cultural and Religious **Contact Studied on the Basis of Selected Missionary Collections in Germany and Poland**

Goals of the Workshop

The primary goal of this workshop is to bring together scholars from Poland and Germany who are working on missionary collections and are interested in exploring the material dimensions of cultural and religious contact from various disciplinary perspectives.

The long-term goal of the cooperation is to continue and expand collaborative research about cultural and religious contact between Asia, Africa, and Europe based on missionary collections in Europe. The theoretical and methodological approach of this cooperation is deliberately interdisciplinary, inviting scholars from different fields of research, and working with different methods and theories. Thus, researchers from anthropology/ethnology, art history, African studies, comparative religion, sinology, and various area studies will participate in the workshop.

In the first step, we seek to establish an operative working cooperation with missionary collections in the regions of North Rhine-Westphalia (Germany) and Kraków as well as Pieniężno (Poland) in order to include further partners in Europe from there. These collections contain highly relevant artifacts for research that have not yet been explored in a comparative, cross-regional study.

This workshop will take place at CERES to discuss the perspectives of the participating scholars and initiate steps towards a possible joint application for funding. To consult the start of this cooperation and advise us on possible directions, we have invited two external experts for guest lectures on the topic.
